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Preface:

Our college is named after the great freedom fighter Lokmanya Tilak who, in the course of struggle for freedom, laid down a four-point formula for the success of the same. The said formula included dissemination of national education which weighed with Shri Loknayak Bapuji Aney, an illustrious son of the soil and ardent follower of Lokmanya Tilak, who planted such a seed of education at a remote and rural place like Wani in July 1928 by establishing a society called Shikshan Prasark Mandal, Wani. Initally the facility of primary, middle and high school level education was made available to the local people. Following independence, this movement of education acquired further momentum and a degree level college was founded at Shrikrushana Bhavan on 5th July 1961 with 67 students on its rolls of Arts Faculty. (It will not be out of place to mention here that the committee that was sent by Nagpur University and that granted first affiliation to our institution, included stalwarts of the caliber of Dr. V.B. Kolte, Dr. G.T.Deshpande and Dr. V.V. Mirashi.) The very next year another faculty, namely, commerce was added to the institution. Four years later, shortage of space emerged as a major constraint. To cope with this problem, the parent body joined hands and entered into an agreement with another local institution name Tilak Smarak Trust. The trust agreed to donate space and auditorium to the college on conditions that the name of the college be Lokmnanya Tilak Mahavidyalaya and that a series of lectures named after Lokmanya Tilak be arranged every year. The conditions were accepted by the college authorities. Accordingly the college was renamed Lokmanya Tilak Mahavidyalaya and the first lecture of the said series was deliverd by the then Principal, Shri Ram Shewalkar who was a distinguished orator himself.

The college started another series of lectures from 1969 onwards in honor of Loknayak Shri Bapuji Aney, the founder, philosopher and guide of our college, who passed away on 26 January 1968. Our institution initiated many noteworthy activities like the organization of first Marathi Pradhyapak Parishad of Nagpur University in 1968-69 and of first camp of Acharya Kul under the chairmanship of the well known freedom fighter Acharya Vinoba Bhave in 1970-71. In order to pay tribute to Loknayak's passion for science, the faculty of science with Phyics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany and Zoology as the core subjects was started in 1975. The faculty was further augumented with the introduction of computer science as a subject in 1997. The three postgraduate departments namely Marathi, English and History were started in 1998, 2003 and 2012 respectively. UGC funded career oriented courses like Functional English, Water Quality and Soil Testing and Accountancy and Auditing were launched thereafter in 2012 the chemistry department of the college organized a UGC Sponsored national level conference. The laboratory of the chemistry department

obtained recognition as a research laboratory from the parent university. With four research supervisors, fifteen Ph.D. and seven M.Phil holders, our institution has been striving hard to create, enrich and maintain an environment conducive to research against many odds.

-: Executive Summary:-

I Curricular Aspects:

Since 1961 the college has been functioning with vision and predetermined mission. Realistic objectives, well-defined methods of curriculum delivery and efficient deployment of action plan help our institution to perform better even in adverse academic situations. The exercise of curriculum upgradation is carried out at various platforms of parent university where feedback from beneficiaries of our college is taken into consideration and acted on. As we offer eighteen options for the students of ARTS faculty, three options for those of SCIENCE faculty and option of choosing Marathi/English as the medium of instruction for the students of COMMERCE faculty, academic flexibility can justifiably be considered a forte of our college. Three CAREER-ORIENTED, UGC SPONSORED courses like Functional English, Water Quality and Soil Testing and Accountancy and Auditing are taught in the college. Besides, Post graduation courses in Marathi, English and History are available for rural area students of this region. Overall value based approach of our institution leads to holistic development of the students.

II Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

Well defined and transparent admission process with merit list for science and commerce faculties and on-spot admission for arts faculty ensures justice to the learners of rural area. Another way in which social justice is promoted is the intake of a significant number of students belonging to reserved category. Multi tier strategy is followed to bridge the knowledge gap of students. A balanced approach is adopted to meet the additional requirements of advanced learners and necessary support is provided to slow learners. Well-planned teaching, learning processes with micro and macro dimensions are formulated with the help of IQAC. A student centric approach is pursued to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students. Knowledge and skill are duly imparted via various counseling activites. Library facility extended to the students and staff is fairly adequate. The institution feels proud of having four faculty members who are receipents of prestigious awards. Pro-reform pattern, meticulous evaluation and effective grievance redressal system constitute another salient feature of our institution. Inclusive teaching, learning and assessment strategies contribute to the development of graduate attributes among our students.

III Research, Consultancy and Extension

The faculty profile of our college comprises fifteen Ph.D., seven M.Phil and eight PG holders with one professor, four associate professors and twenty three assistant professors with one qualified librarian and one director of physical education who have not only participated in

fifteen quality improvement programs including refresher, orientation and short term courses but also availed themselves of various UGC schemes like PTAC, MRP and FDP. Recognized research laboratory (Chemistry Department) and five research supervisors and occasional arrangement of research conferences considerably help to create, maintain and nurture an atmosphere conducive to the promotion of scientific temper and research culture. The UGC sponsored national level research conference organized by the chemistry department in 2012 is one such milestone in the history of our institution. Interdisciplinary researches are also carried out by way of papers written jointly by faculty members from different departments. Publication of one hundred and twenty eight papers in national journals and of eighty eight papers in internaionational journals with impact factor totaling 49.7421 along with completion of six UGC funded minor research projects attest to the richness of institutional tradition of research. Moreover our faculty members edited three books, authored twenty five books bearing ISBN and sixteen chapters in various books. Besides teachers, our students too participate in research based events. There are three areas like agriculture, academics and environement in which the faculty members of our institution extend their valuable services. Numerous activites to discharge institutional and social responsibilities are organized through NSS and NCC units of our college. Promotion of tree plantation, development of oratory and publication of research material are undertaken in collaboration with external activity centres.

IV Infrastructure & Learning Resources

The institution has following infrastructure and learning resources: There are twenty one classrooms, nine students' corridors, seven laboratories, two auditoriums (HALL and Open theater), four cabins, three offices and six utility centers. UGC grants and management contributions enable institution to develop infrastructure facilities. Infact, construction of two new classrooms is recently completed with a total expenditure of Rs. 25,00,000/- out of which UGC's share was Rs. 5,00,000/-. As far as library resources are concerned, there are 49202 books, 1461 reference books, 23 journals, 30 magazines, 12 news papers. The process of library automation is in progress with subscription to NLIST. The college which has sixty computers with fourteen utility centers, 3 LCD Projectors, 19 printers regulary updates information technology facilities of the campus. In last four years institution spent Rs. 3,15,590/- on computer maintaince.

V Student Progression and support

The college prospectus which is published every year contains updated and relevant information. 93.30% of the total numbers of students are beneficiaries of government scholarships and freeships. The college provides facilities like remedial coaching, career

counseling and coaching for entry in services. Besides, there are extension centers, like sports department, NSS, NCC units. Entreprenurship skill development, one of the major activities undertaken by commerce department has played a key role in grooming entrepreneurs who were former students of the college. Institution is proud to say that so far twenty four students have cleared NET/SET in various subjects. In recent past ten and eleven students joined military and civil services respectively. Apart from all these, institution boasts of career guidance and placement cell, students' grivence redressal cell, anti-ragging committee, alumni association. Sixteen students won university colour coats in sports events and eight students secured colour coats in drama and cultural events and one faculty member bagged color coat for efficient team managment. Students publish wall magazines at regular intervals and the annual college magazine entitled 'Aradhana' provides them with opportunities to showcase their talents. College constitutes students' council in accordance with the norms of Parent University and students are allowed to represent on various committees.

VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution has a two-tier leadership consisting of 'Shikshan Prasarak Mandal' and Principal for framing of plans and polices and their execution respectively. Besides, the institution grants permission to the faculty members to contest university level elections to academic bodies like Board of Studies and Senate and grooms academic leaders. A number of faculty members of our college have joined other institutions as principals. The college sincerely follows the spirit of participative management both at planning and operational levels. Pursuit of excellence constitutes the core of the institution's quality policy for which it draws up perspective plan to upgrade institution from undergraduate to postgraduate level on one hand and to add other relevant subjects at undergraduate level on the other hand. Management encourages effectiveness and efficiency even at the level of non teaching employees. As many as 19 non teaching staff members attended various training programs and upgraded their knowledge. Out of a review mechanism, a new system of teaching, learning and evaluation is evolved. The issue of Staff welfare is addressed with the effective The practice of annual audit is followed functioning of two cooperative societies. scrupulously. The college has an active IQAC with due representation of society and industry.

VII: Innovation and Best Practices

Institution makes all possible attempts to spread general environmental awareness through a variety of activities and programs, although a green audit is yet to be conducted. Use of solar lights, CFL and installation of rain water harvesting unit, dissemination of general awareness

about environmental hazards posed by use of polythene bags, about the necessity of afforestation are some of the steps taken by the institution. Institution level innovations include crafting of teahing learning evaluation model and office automation by a college employee. Use of knowledge for societal upliftment and development of effective teaching learning method are the best practices that institution follows.

Vision: The college aims to create an environment for multi dimensional growth of the students by organizing various co-curricular activities. Therefore, traditional degree education should be supplemented with skill-based short-term career courses. To enable students to ensure their all-round growth and sustainable careers they are imparted both knowledge and skill.

Mission: Gender neutral empowerment of economically and socially challenged students through education and knowledge so that they can grow up as contributors and solution providers to the problems of society.

Objectives

- 1) To provide an opportunity of higher education to everyone in general and to economically and socially challenged students in particular.
- 2) To create an environment for multi dimensional growth of students.
- 3) To inculcate skill and knowledge among students.
 - The board containing Vision & Mission statement along with the objectives is displayed at the entrance of the college. These are also communicated via website & prospectus. Moreover these are referred to by our Principal on various occasions.

Exercise is carried out towards the end of academic session for matching core competencies of faculty members in tune with curriculum contents and expected student strength for the next session. The activities are listed below

Teachers receive support in the form of a well organized time-table, LCD, DVD player, OHP, discussion-friendly classrooms, Internet facilities, computers, library facility, student feedback forms, inputs from other colleges etc. Faculty members also enrich themselves by attending refresher courses, seminars, training programs in their respective fields.

The College prepares its own calendar on the basis of University calendar. This is initially discussed at meetings with Heads of Departments. The departmental activities are planned and incorporated in the academic calendar of the college and then the final calendar is circulated to all the departments. The due mechanism in the form of departmental meetings has been provided for mid-term review of implementation and corrective steps are taken wherever and whenever required.

Internal examinations and practical examinations are planned well in advance along with other syllabus based activities like seminar sessions, guest talks, activities of students' forum etc. The system of students' counseling along with regular formal teaching methods has always ensured effective curriculum delivery. The facility of remedial coaching classes on the request from the students is also available.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum? The college follows a close track on university curriculum. The faculty members of the college represent and contribute to various university bodies like BOS, RRC, academic council, syllabus revision committee etc.

The college has purchased an Atomic Absorption Spectrophotometer for providing Soil Testing assistance to the farmers of this region. The career oriented program of Water Quality and Soil Testing aims to provide the technical knowhow required for farming industry.

Dr. K.R. Rajput is engaged with the book review exercise of Economics B.A. part I, II and III titled Micro Economics, Macro Economics and Indian Economy, Development and Environmental Economics for R.T.M.Nagpur University, Nagpur. He has worked as a paper setter for Ph.D. Aptitude Test of S.G.B.Amravati University, Amravati as well.

The mediocre students are motivated for the use of parallel study material so as to improve their level of understanding.

Students of B.Com. are provided with the facility to opt either for English or for Marathi as the medium of instruction.

 - 1) Functional English: To improve the skills of local students in conversational English, our college has introduced certificate course in functional English. The aim of the course is to impart basic language skills and communicative ability to our rural

- students. The alumni of the course often teach in local English medium schools.
- 2) Water Quality and Soil Testing: The chemistry department of our college has established a landmark in the area of research. The laboratory of this department has been recognized by the parent university as a research laboratory with two Ph.D. supervisors. In order to discharge social responsibility towards the region, the department decided to provide the testing facility of water and soil for the nearby areas. As a step in this direction, the department has launched a course of certificate and diploma in Water Quality and Soil Testing. Students availing themselves of the said certificate and diploma courses have bagged jobs in government and private sectors.
- 3) Auditing and Accountancy: In order to enhance employability of the students of the region, the commerce department has promoted a career oriented certificate course in Auditing and Accountancy.

The college cannot modify, enrich and organize the curriculum on its own. However our representatives on the statutory bodies of University such as syllabus sub committee, board of studies, faculty and academic councils are actively involved in modifying and enriching the syllabi. The feedback of the students and requirements of the employment market are duly conveyed to appropriate authorities by using suitable platforms. It won't be out of place to mention in this context that the syllabus of post graduate diploma in non conventional energy sources has been designed under the chairmanship of Prof. A.Y.Karkhanis, former head, department of Physics of our college.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

Environmental Science is one of the COMPLUSORY subjects for all second year students irrespective of the streams. The women empowerment exercises are duly promoted through redressal of womens grievance cell. The department of computer science of our college is providing facility to the students of arts and commerce faculty to use ICT. The internet laboratory has been established in the reading room of the college.

- 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?
 - moral and ethical values

The NSS and NCC units of the college are very keen on organizing the programs that inculcate moral and ethical values among students. NSS unit of the college has organized several activities in tune with 10 commandments laid down by a well known social reformer and saint Gadge Baba after whom our university has been named. These programs include organising food camp, literacy programs and distributing clothes etc. Lectures delivered by eminent persons from the literary

world are arranged to widen the exposure of and inculcate moral values among students.

employable and life skills

The UGC sponsored cell titled 'Entry in Services', is instrumental in creating a platform where various communicative, computational, organizational and technical skills (like photography, acting, handicraft and journalism) are imparted to enable the beneficiaries to enhance their employability and to overcome challenges of daily life.

better career options

The career counseling cell of the college plays an important role in making students aware of various career options available to them. Motivational talks of such persons as have distinguished themselves in various fields are organized at regular intervals.

community orientation

Regular features of community services rendered by our institution include blood donation camp, tree plantation, pulse polio awareness, save girl child awareness, survey of academic exclusion, socio economic survey, NSS Camps. Information displayed on website regarding rain forecast is made available to the farmers of the region.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.

The commerce department of the college has a substantial number of students from agriculture background. In the course of discussion the students from agriculture families requested for designing agriculture accounting for their farm occupation. The department accepted this informal feedback and submitted a proposal to Board of Studies, Accounts Board for incorporating Agriculture Accounting in to the syllabus of B.Com. part one. Eventually, on the basis of students' suggestion, a topic titled 'Farm Accounting' has been included in the syllabus of B.Com. Part I Accountancy paper from academic year 2013-14.

A former student of our institution Mr. Vivek Polshettiwar now working in TIFR, Mumbai suggested for inclusion of super conductivity and nano technology in B.Sc. syllabus. We are glad to state that these two topics have been included in the syllabus of B.Sc. final year of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The institution ensures full proof planning of various enrichment programs with

predefined expected outcome from the same. The discussions with the faculty member during the meetings help to finalize the modus operandi for the implementation of these enrichment programs. The feedback from the students during and at the end of the program helps in revising and redefining the quality parameters on this front.

 - The institution is extending its contribution to the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University through its faculty members. The experiences of retired teachers and alumni are put together and essential and important parts thereof are conveyed to statutory bodies of the university.
- 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes? As such the institution does not have any formal mechanism at its disposal for obtaining feedback regarding curriculum from the students and the stakeholders. However, vital contents of informal discussions with students, alumni & retired teachers are communicated to the university.
- 1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

 Some faculty members have obtained recognition as research supervisors following with the college has started research programs. For instance, the chemistry department got its laboratory recognized by the University with an intake capacity of 6 students. The Economics department, Marathi Department and Sanskrit department do have Ph.D. intake of 8 candidates each. Thus the facility of pursuing doctoral research is made available to students of rural area.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The institution ensures wide publicity for the admission process through an annually updated college prospectus containing information regarding the courses available in the college and their intake capacities along with other information relating to the admission process. The information about the courses offered by the institute is available on the website of the institute. In the college premises the admission programmes to various streams is prominently displayed on the notice board. The admissions of the students in the college are held in accordance with University /State Government rules and on merit basis if required.

A well-defined admission process has been established by the college. An Admission Committee is constituted including an over-all in-charge of the Admission Committee along with course-wise admission committee members. The procedure of admission is clearly mentioned in the prospectus. The programme/course-wise admission work of the admission committee begins after the declaration of results of the qualifying examinations. A separate arrangement is made for pre admission counseling by the faculty members. Course-wise application forms are collected and after verifying the documents spot admission is offered to the students of Arts Stream, whereas merit list is prepared for the aspirants of Science and Commerce Streams. The admission process is fully computerized through software exclusively meant for the process. Computerization in this regard ensures transparency in the admission process.

- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.
 - Our experiences of several decades show that demand for the courses of arts stream matches the intake capacity of the institution for B.A. and M.A. Hence the college follows the policy of spot admission to all the eligible students for B.A. and M.A. course. On the other hand, the demand for admission to B.Sc. and B.Com. far exceeds the existing intake capacity of the institution and therefore a merit list is prepared accordingly. The admission process is detailed as below:

Spot Admission Process for the Arts Faculty

- 1. Sale of prospectus
- 2. Duly filled application forms are scrutinized and original documents are verified by

the admission committee.

- 3. Xerox copies are attested by the members of admission committee.
- 4. On the same counter of admission committee, pre admission counseling takes place.
- 5. In pre admission counseling information regarding different combinations of the subjects along with its suitability & compatibility is provided to every student. Accordingly, students finalize their selection of subjects.
- 6. Verified and completed application forms are now submitted along with requisite fees in the administrative section.
- 7. After the series of processes, admission is finalized and a receipt to that effect is issued to the student by the institution.
- 8. The concerned clerk prepares a list of students admitted and displays it on the notice board at the end of the day.
- 9. The cases of admission after the dead line of the university are referred to the university and finalized as per their guidelines.

Procedure for admitting the students on Merit List basis for B.Sc. & B.Com. courses.

- 1. Sale of prospectus
- 2. Duly filled application forms are scrutinized and original documents are verified by the admission committee.
- 3. Xerox copies are attested by the members of admission committee.
- 4. On the same counter of admission committee, pre admission counseling takes place.
- 5. Duly filled application forms are accepted for inclusion in merit list.
- 6. Thereafter, category wise merit list is prepared and displayed on the notice board.
- 7. The steps of finalizing the admission are followed as mentioned under spot admission.

Since ours is an old and reputed educational institution in Wani, most of the local students prefer to seek admission to our college. Besides ours is only institution to offer B.Sc. program. The other two colleges namely Noor Jahan Begum

Mahavidyalaya and Jagannatha Maharaj Mahavidyalaya offer B.A. and B.Com. courses. Naturally, our college has an advantage over the two other local colleges.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Initially students were granted admission to the courses on the basis of spot admission method. However with the passage of time there was a marked increase in the students' tendency to seek admission to B.Sc. & B.Com. courses. As a result the review committee felt the necessity of preparing merit lists for above mentioned two courses. Accordingly, from last two academic sessions onward the system of merit list has been put in place for these two courses. However, the system of spot admission continues for the admission of students in arts faculty.

The State Government has prescribed a stipulated quota for different sections of students from disadvantaged communities viz., SC, ST, VJ / NT and OBC. This is taken into consideration during admissions. Information regarding quota, scholarships, free-ships and concessions for economically backward classes are furnished in the prospectus. Preference is given to sports personnel wherever possible. The important fact that the total number of girl students seeking admission to various courses in the college always far exceeds that of the boys highlights the institution's contribution towards the cause of women empowerment.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

There are very rare cases of differently-abled students seeking admission to the college. However, every care is taken to provide due preference to such students in admission process. And thus academic functioning of the college adheres to government policies in this regard.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The institution follows a concept of finishing school. The first week is devoted to a detailed enquiry into the retention of course contents by the students of the qualifying examination. On this front an opportunity is capitalized to bridge the gap between the demand of the course and actual academic standing of students. The students with lower scoring are advised to revise the vital contents of syllabus of qualifying examination under the able guidance of faculty members. They avail themselves of the facility of reading room and library book.

For Science students, various departments organize laboratory workshops for the entry level students to get them acquainted with the functioning of the laboratory so as to improve their understanding required for experimentation.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.)

The institution follows multi tier strategy to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students and to enable them to cope with the expected level of knowledge and application

- I) Finishing School
- II) Book and learning resources
- III) FAQ on initial topics
- IV) Samples of Supplementary study material
- V) Self-expression Sessions
- VI) Remedial Coaching

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender inclusion, environment etc.?

The true spirit of co-education is observed in the overall academic functioning of the college. The women grievance cell continues to keep a tab on gender discrimination related issues. But fortunately the grievance box of the college does not contain even a single complaint related to gender discrimination. Due awareness is ensured through the Principal's address in the beginning of the academic session and timely notices for students.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

During initial discussions with the students faculty members collect the data of students' performance in qualifying examination of respective subjects. This enables them to identify the advanced learners. Thereafter, separate counseling sessions are organized for advanced learners. Their performance is further monitored in frequent oral question-answer sessions conducted by the subject teacher in the classroom and through other modes of evaluation like laboratory test, Unit Tests, Home Assignments, seminars, group discussions, and presentations.

Advanced learners are encouraged to acquire latest knowledge in their disciplines. Teachers recommend the required further reading, creative writing, participating in seminars and in group discussions, ICT- enabled learning, preparation of power point presentations and reading reference books. Career counseling and coaching for competitive examinations like MPSC, UPSC, JRF, NET/SLET etc. are also provided to students.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

Discussions with the students that takes place in the beginning of academic sessions, the teaching staff collect the data of students' performance in qualifying examination of respective subjects. This enables them to identify the slow learners. After having identified the slow learners, the following steps are taken to improve their performance:-

- 1) Counseling sessions are conducted to motivate them to work hard and overcome their weaknesses.
- 2) They are provided with study material and question bank.

- 3) Separate remedial classes are also organized for them.
- 4) In fact the class room activities are so planned that the slow learners receive encouragement and further opportunities to learn from the participation and performance of advanced learners.
- 5) Parents of such students are informally apprised about the progress of their wards.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Academic Calendar

The Academic Planning and Audit Committee prepare a semester/ annual plan for the coming session at the end of the previous year. The academic calendar is drawn up as a part of college semester /annual plan. The departmental meetings towards the end of academic session put a focus on revising teaching plans for the next academic year. The macro and micro level teaching plans ensure well organized academic functioning of the institution. The teaching plans containing monthly and term-wise teaching schedules are submitted to the departmental heads at the beginning of the academic session.

The departmental heads closely monitor teaching and suggest mid-term corrections/ revisions wherever necessary. This ensures completion of allotted syllabus on time. Overall monitoring is performed by the Academic Planning and Audit Committee.

Teaching-Learning

At the individual level the teacher makes an attempt to follow a teaching plan prepared by him/her. He/she maintains a record of information regarding execution of teaching plan and keeps the head of the department well informed. Documents like time-table, workload, internal evaluation and examination schedule and leave record are maintained. Departmental meetings are organized regularly to keep an eye on teaching learning process.

Evaluation

Learning is evaluated continuously through unit tests, home assignments, seminars, group discussions, etc. The examination schedule of the college is prepared and communicated to the students through timely notifications. An attempt is made to follow the schedule scrupulously. The Examination Committee of the college monitors the conduct of the examinations. The students are duly communicated and an appropriate feedback is provided from the teachers regarding their performance in

unit tests, home assignments and the terminal examinations. The record is maintained accordingly.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The IQAC of the college has devised its own mechanism to ensure the initiation and successful execution of teaching-learning process. The college believes in timely identification and rectification of loop holes, if any, in the said process. Guidance, if required, is sought from the head of faculty and Academic Planning and Audit Committee to further improve the overall process.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The institution has a fairly rich culture of making the learning process reasonably student-centric. It is accomplished with the efforts of teachers in reaching out to students. The learning mechanism of the college has provided a platform where cordial relations founded on mutual trust is established between learners and facilitators. The dialogue between teachers and students facilitates the communication of students' problems and grievances related to the process of learning. Since Wani is a small place with a small population, most of teachers are acquainted with the parents of the students. Hence through personal interactions the teachers establish intimacy with the students. Moreover, the students have an opportunity to convey their opinions regarding academic and infrastructural shortcomings of the institution through the feedback mechanism. Thus students are always encouraged to open up and let the faculty and the college administration know about the areas that can be improved upon.

In the process of learning the participation of the students is given top priority. Most of the programs are organized through different associations of students. The students are provided a sharing in the process of decision making with necessary support and timely guidance from the teachers. The institution organizes various programmes and activities and guest lectures of eminent personalities on a variety of topics including personality development, leadership qualities and awareness of social responsibilities, debate competitions, group discussions, street plays, rallies, yoga competition etc. Linguistic skills and kinesics are imparted through career-oriented courses and screening of films. The NCC & NSS units of the college have major share in making these programs student and society-centric. These programs aim at imparting life and management skills.

The institution is very keen on exposing the students to seminars, workshops and conferences. They are also encouraged to organize field visits, excursions & study tours. The college has a special cell imparting coaching for competitive examinations.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The very learning process of the institution is such that it helps students to nurture critical thinking. For example, tools like situational analysis, case study, news discussion, issue based debates, discussion on budget, debate on Lokpal, elocution contest on women reservation, paper presentation on food security bill, workshop on natural farming enabled them to develop their ability to think critically.

Besides, three lecture series named Lokmanya Tilak, Bapuji Aney & Ram Shewalkar vyakhyanmala provide the students with an opportunity to listen to and gain from the speeches delivered by stalwarts drawn from different fields of life. This enables them to think differently which in turn inculcates creativity in them. Moreover, activities like photography workshop, handicraft workshop and drama workshop provide a platform for developing and demonstrating creativity.

The science club of the college organizes popular lecture series at regular intervals. Through these lectures scientific temper is inculcated among the students who participate in rallies like beti bachao, andhshraddha nirmulan, tree plantation, vasundhara bachao organized by local NGOs and Marathi Vidnyan Parishad. Some competitions are organized for the students on Environment Day and National Science Day that are celebrated every year.

We are very proud to say that alumni of the college include such devoted lifelong learners and distinguished innovators as Dr. Vivek Poleshettiwar, Scientist, TIFR, Dr. Nitin Kakade, Scientist BARC, Shri Obed Hussain, I.T. Personnel, Amit Fulzele pursuing post doctoral research at California University and many others.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

ICT-based learning, CDs, power point presentations, use of LCD/multimedia, overhead projector, charts and models are important components of teaching in the college. Every department has an access to computers with internet facility. Laboratories are upgraded with sophisticated equipment and other facilities. The

- language laboratory of the college is an add-on facility that the students use to improve their communication ability.
- 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

 In order to keep pace with the recent developments and advanced level of knowledge and skills in various subjects, students and teachers make use of latest journals and reference books from the college library. The internet facility in every department helps them to download the latest information in the field. The assignments and projects are so designed that the students get an opportunity to collect the material on the latest development on the subject. Through Orientation & Refresher Courses, short term workshops, seminars and conferences the learners get an opportunity to get exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skill.
- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling / mentoring / academic advise) provided to students?
 - Pre admission counseling: In this process of pre-admission counseling all the new entrants get benefitted every year.
 - Text book library: Students from poor families are provided with free text books.
 Teachers also support such students by lending books from their personal collection.
 <u>Five students</u> of every class are benefitted by this scheme.
 - Career counseling: The College has a career counseling cell with an intake capacity
 of 100 students. Moreover on several occasions various programs and adhoc
 activities are organized to extend the outreach of such cell to a large number of
 students.
 - Mentoring sessions: The departmental heads and faculty members organize the
 mentoring sessions twice in a year. Main focus of such sessions is to guide and
 motivate educationally weaker students.
 - Motivational workshops: Faculty of every stream organizes motivational workshops during which students are encouraged to read books authored by motivational writers.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The institution has a thrust on Activity Based Teaching Learning in all streams and courses.

1) Every department of science faculty uses charts and models prepared by the students

- and displayed in their laboratories. These charts cover topics dealt with in the regular curriculum. In addition to this, students are encouraged to prepare power point presentation on some of the topics. Through internet, some animated video clippings are downloaded and made available to students.
- 2) The commerce department of the college accords top priority to market based learning. For example, in final year market and product surveys are conducted to elucidate a paper on 'Principles of Marketing'. Furthermore, feedback through questionnaire and interview schedule of customers is also carried out. The awareness exercise is designed to mobilize the opinions and ratings of stratified customers regarding latest trends of the subject.
- 3) Marathi department of the college has devised an innovative teaching practice which has earned due recognition. The novel 'Birhad', a part of syllabus of B.A. final year Marathi, has been transformed first into a play and then in to a movie as a part of a successful experiment. Students of our college have participated in several open theatre shows in a number of colleges. The university has acknowledged the contribution of the institution by conferring 'Innovative Practices Award'.
- In this regard the institution has adopted a three tier facility comprising Central Library, Departmental Library, and Individual Library. The students first have an access to central library for the issue of a book as per schedule. The supplementary teaching material can be procured from the departmental library. The advanced learners are benefitted with supply of additional learning material from the individual faculty members. The reading room facility plays an important role in teaching learning process. The internet facility available in reading room is helpful to the students willing to gain updated knowledge. The library is enriched with a good number of quality reference books.
- 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.
 In case of the course following annual pattern there is no such difficulty in completing the course as per plan. However for semester pattern course, it is difficult to complete the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar as the number of teaching days are divided in two semesters. Problems arising out of teachers going on long leave are solved by extra coaching on holidays.
- 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The teachers go through the result sheets in their subjects and hold discussions on subjects in which students' performance is poor. Then they are asked to state their difficulties in teaching and improving the performance of students. The issue is then referred to IQAC and Academic Planning Committee for further discussions. Accordingly the teachers are asked to get equipped to tackle the problem with greater self confidence and skill.

The institution always keeps an eye on the proportion of regular and clock hour basis teachers. As soon as a regular teacher retires, a process is initiated to recruit a new teacher. Ours is a grant-in-aid college with a handsome number of permanent full time faculty members. The faculty members leave college before retirement only when they get opportunities to become Principals in other colleges or to join University level posts.

The institution is very keen on motivating teachers to take up researches. The institution has implemented policy of getting students' feed back every year. Based on this evaluation a performance appraisal card is provided to the teachers. This appraisal card helps teachers to introspect and improve the quality of their teaching process.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The stakeholders are made aware about the evaluation process through formal mechanisms like Principal's address, notices displayed on the notice board, and staff meetings. A separate evaluation committee is established every year. Informal instructions, whenever and wherever required, are given to the students by the faculty members.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

As the status of institution is that of an affiliated college, it is mandatory for the college to follow the policy of evaluation as prescribed by the university. The university has introduced internal assessment system for all the courses at degree level. The institution is very particular about following the mechanism of internal evaluation in a proper manner.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university by generating awareness among the stakeholders. Students are informed about the departmental time tables and schedules of examination in the beginning of the session. Teachers convey the importance of internal assessment/ evaluation for the benefit of the students. Students get to know about their own performances in internal evaluation.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The formative evaluation is attempted through unit tests, university semester examination in science faculty and annual examination in Arts and Commerce faculties. The summative evaluation is carried through different types of programs such as various competitions, volunteering in social activities, participating in students' program, seminars, group discussions etc. Incentive marks are given to the students participating in NCC, NSS and sports and university level youth festival activities. We have a tradition of awarding a star performer of the college based on

his/ her all-round contribution in Sports, NSS, Youth Festival, Student Council and brilliant performance in the examination. The awards of 2014-15 and 2015-16 were given to Karishma Nawale, B.A. III and Shubham Madan student B.Sc. III year respectively. Another student Miss. Pooja Jadhav was named the best NSS cadet by the university in the year 2013-14.

2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? The consolidated result sheets received from the university are handed over to various departments for regular monitoring in the next academic year. The next year's performance of students in internal evaluation is compared with his/her last year's annual performance. Then students are counseled and encouraged to perform in a better manner.

Since the majority of our students are first generation learners, their performances in university examinations show a slow but progressive improvement.

 - Internal evaluation process helps teachers to assess the achievement of learning objectives and planning. If the performance of the students in initial exercise of internal assessment in some subjects is found not up to the mark, remedial coaching schedules are planned.

 - At the college level student has an opportunity to seek clarification regarding his/her performance. He/ she can express dissatisfaction by approaching the Principal. At the university level student can seek a photo copy of answer sheet and he/ she can also apply for revaluation of answer sheet.

2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes

 - Since the vision of the institution subsumes the learning outcomes no separate document has been prepared by the college. The teachers are encouraged, during the course of deliberations, to counsel the students to achieve excellence in their field.

 - Since the institution is located in a rural area and since most of our students are first generation learners, they lack minimum standards and competence. Therefore, the

institution follows the strategy of extensive communication through individual and group counseling so that they gain basic knowledge and skill. Subsequently they are motivated to pursue advanced knowledge and develop themselves as responsible members of society.

2.6.3 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

Subjects like sociology, political science, economics and history help the students to understand their social responsibilities. The socio economic surveys conducted by the students of our college make their learning socially relevant. Though the undergraduate programs offered by the college may not have a direct bearing on job market we try our hardest to make students ready for professional post graduation The UGC sponsored Career Counseling Cell and Entry in Services cell is instrumental in organizing various activities like Rojagar Melawa (Job Fair) and career camps. These programs help them to understand the relevance of their curriculum and the importance of learning.

2.6.4 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Every department has also a list of its own distinguished alumni. The institution organizes interactive sessions for our students with our distinguished alumni in different sectors. These sessions serve as a background for improvement in planning of teaching learning process. From our long experiences we found that insufficient grounding in and understanding of English language prevent a very large number of our students from acquiring knowledge and performing well in interviews. Tutorial classes, remedial classes and special courses taught in Functional English try to address and solve these problems.

The Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities & Challenges (SWOC) profile exercise helps students to attain the above mentioned goals.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Though ours is basically an undergraduate college, the laboratory of the chemistry department of our college is recognized as a research centre (with an intake capacity of six Ph.D. students) by Sant Gadge Baba Amravait University. Of the six research students who have completed their doctoral researches so far, five students have been awarded Ph.D. degree, while one is awaiting result. In the same department (Chemistry) six more students are pursuing their doctoral research. In all, there are five recognized Ph.D. supervisors belonging to Chemistry, Marathi, Economics and Sanskrit departments.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

The college has constituted a research committee headed by the Principal of the institution with three doctorate faculty members from Arts, Commerce and Science respectively. The committee has identified the thrust areas of research in different subjects. The faculty members of the college select their areas of research by keeping the thrust areas in mind. The four MRP proposals were recently finalized, reports were submitted and NOCS were obtained accordingly.

The institution grants autonomy to the principal investigator. Grants received from agencies are released and made available to the recipients on time. Adequate infrastructure in the form of laboratory equipment, library books, journals and ICT facilities by way of computer laboratory are made available. Duty leave is sanctioned

to fulltime teachers to enable them not only to attend conferences, workshops and seminars and but also to conduct field work.

The accounts section of the office is very punctual in facilitating timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

Being an undergraduate institution our major thrust is on teaching the curriculum. However, the students of the institute participate in inter-collegiate/ inter-university avishkar program, seminar competition etc. The students also conduct some market surveys & consumer surveys to have insight into market research. The institute celebrates NSD on 28th of February every year. A variety of programs are organized to inculcate scientific temper and aptitude among the students. Especially, the projects undertaken and completed by students of B.Sc. II and III year, aim at promoting scientific temper and research culture.

All the teachers are engaged in individual/collaborative research activity and have authored research papers published in different journals and proceedings of conferences.

3.1.6 Give details of workshops/ training programmes/ sensitization programmes conducted/organized by the institution with focus on capacity building in terms of research and imbibing research culture among the staff and students.

The college organized a National Level Conference in Chemistry in 2012. Three

hundred researchers participated in the conference and ninety five papers were published in the proceedings bearing ISBN no. 978-81-905776-12-1. Besides, sixty five papers were presented during oral and poster presentation sessions. The university grants commission financed the research conference to the tune of Rs. 1,50,000/-. The college magazine issue of that year 'Aradhana' was devoted to the themes like dissemination of Science Culture and promotion of scientific attitude.

Naturally our teaching staff members are constantly motivated to take the students to farm lands to expose them to the basics of agriculture. In fact, one of our colleagues Dr. Dilip Alone directed a movie on farming titled 'Garbhat Matichya Dis Soniyacha'. In recognition of his varied contributions to agriculture, the state government awarded him Krushi Puraskar.

Our institution accords full freedom to the faculty members to work with external agencies in accordance with their respective areas of expertise. The faculty members of botany department are allowed to work on the issue of tree plantation. Other faculty members of Science and English departments are allowed to help local private English medium schools. Since the institution enjoys a high reputation in and around Wani, formal publicity and advocacy of available expertise have not been considered necessary.

The institution is planning to provide consultancy on the following fronts:

- 1) To provide facility to test potable water.
- 2) To provide academic consultancy to schools.
- 3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The institution allows staff members to work with other formal setups of the nearby region. Duty leave is sanctioned for such assignments. Prof. Ravindra Matte of botany department guides the local people regarding development and maintenance of garden. Moreover, he helps the local forest department regarding development of forest in the nearby region. His contributions as a member of Vruksh Sanvardhan

Samiti of Wani have been acknowledged on several occasions. Another senior colleague from the Physics department Prof. Arvind Karkhanis visited several private schools for assisting them to improve quality and upgrade skill. Even after his retirement, he continues to offer his valuable services to a CBSE affiliated school named 'Sansakr Bharati Public School' at Warora.

Though the teaching staff of the college offers valuable services to various sections of the society, the institution has not been able to generate revenue because of the smallness of the place and resultant close personal relationship between the clients and servers of such services.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighborhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

Through different activities like tree plantation, blood donation camp, beti bachao abhiyan, vivekanand sardha shati matsohav, pulse polio drive etc. institute tries to address the problems of society and promote institution-neighborhood-community network. The enthusiastic manner in which students participate in the above mentioned programs enables them to become good citizens of the country thereby ensuring their own holistic development as well as the service of the society. The thought provoking series of lectures and execution of the already mentioned programs accelerate the process of holistic development of students.

Wani and its neighboring areas have been categorized by Government of Maharashtra as Naxalite Belt. However, there is not even a single instance of our students' involvement in and affinity towards the naxalite movement. This is, we feel, because of our continuous efforts to instill democratic principles and impart social and moral values.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The institution follows activity-based mechanism to track students' involvement in various social activities in which extension centers like NSS and NCC play pivotal roles. The attendance, the degree of involvement, participation, initiatives and their overall conduct are the major indicators for tracking the performance of students.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The institution solicits stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality by formal and informal ways. The Murdhoni grampanchyat gave us a letter of appreciation for two consecutive years for rendering best services to their village through our NSS Camp. Many people keep telephonically acknowledging our efforts regarding the extension activities. Moreover the villagers consult the faculty members of the college for any sort of developmental activity in their village.

The institution plans and organizes its extension and outreach programmes mainly through its NSS unit. The university provides annual budget of Rs. 90,000 for NSS camp.

The university allocation per student is Rs. 450/- per annum. The college NSS unit of 200 students is eligible for the allocation of Rs. 90,000. The fifty percent of the said amount is meant for organization of camp and rest 50% is for regular activities of NSS unit.

Our institution is affiliated to the university named after Sant Gadge Baba, who was a well known social reformer and who laid down the fundamental needs of society in the condensed form of 10 commandments. Our institution keeps organising the following activities to follow the spirit of these commandments.

- 1) Feeding the hungry people, a program in which as many as one thousand five hundred hungry people were given food at Jagannath baba mandir, Wani
- 2) Distribution of clothes, another program in which clothes worth thirty thousand rupees were distributed among the slum dwellers of Wani at Diwali.
- 3) Distribution of cloths and sweets, an activity during which inmates of Anand Bal Sadan an orphanage were given cloths and sweets and Sadbhavana Diwas was celebrated.
- 4) In Tree plantation programme 'Harit Parva' a march was organized from Wani to Murdhoni. (10 kms.) and about 500 trees were planted in Murdhoni.
- Health camps were organized during which free medical checkup of more than one thousand villagers was conducted and medicines were distributed free of cost.
- 6) Agriculture workshops for farmers were organized through which well known agriculture experts guided poor people to solve some of their practical difficulties and choose appropriate farm techniques.

The various activities performed by the NSS unit of the college forge a sense of belongingness and nurture social orientation among the students.

- 3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/ International agencies?
 - The institution promotes the participation of students in NSS and NCC by way of internal evaluation and incentive marks. The faculty members are motivated to undergo training programs meant for the faculty in charges of NSS and NCC. They are also given duty leave when programs and activities are held.

A great writer and orator late Ram Shewalkar who happened to be one of the former Principals of our institution, has bequeathed a rich tradition which we try to follow to uplift society and to promote the well being of under privileged and

vulnerable sections of society. As a step in this direction, a Gramin Sahitya Conference was organized in collaboration with Wani based Vidarbha Sahitya Sangha, at Nilapoor-Brahmini. Besides, the college organized a **Tanta Mukti Workshop** in collaboration with **Lokmat Yuva Manch**, Wani to spread the message of peace.

In collaboration with Rasik Rachana Sanskritik and Shaikshinik Kendra Wani, the college also organized an Art Training Camp to impart the skills of various focal arts among the youth of neighboring villages.

- 3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.
 - The institution considers the organization of extension activities as a supplementary though crucial component in addition to the curriculum of text. The participation of students in extension activities augments their interpersonal skills and problem solving ability. Existing finance minister of Maharashtra State is a former student of our institution. Besides, the college groomed four other Members of Legislative Assembly of Maharashtra state Government.
- 3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities?
 - The institution tries to create awareness among the people on various issues related to community development by undertaking activities like Beti Bachav Abhiyan, Pulse Polio Campaign, Environmental and Hygiene awareness programs in which a large number of people voluntarily and enthusiastically participate. College organized a workshop for farmers in which 200 farmers actively participated.

 - As such the institution has not forged any constructive relationship with any other local institution. However the students are motivated to visit places and organizations like Anandwan, Hemalkasa, Dnyanada, Anand Bal Sadan, Gramin Samasya Mukti Trust to have opportunities to render services and to have the satisfaction of discharging some social responsibilities.

A Chandrapur-based blood bank awarded our college for hosting a well organized

blood donation camp.

One student of the college Miss Pooja Jadhav from commerce faculty was adjudged the best NSS Cadet both at University and State level.

In order to create awareness among the farmers of the region, Dr. Dilip Alone, a senior faculty member of Marathi department and a progressive farmer, drew up a program under the NSS unit of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University. During the event titled 'Baliraja Chetana Abhiyan' twelve students of our college undertook a march and covered a distance of around 700 kms. within the jurisdiction of Amravati university. The march which originated from Wani and terminated at Umarkhed and was financed by the parent university, spread awareness on a wide variety of issues through street plays, slogans and banners.

 - There is a collaborative arrangement between the college and a registered organization named 'Vruksh Sanvardhan Samiti' (Tree Conservation Society) Wani for promoting the tree plantation culture in Wani. Prof. Ravindra Matte of the botany department is the secretary of said society. This society has planted and conserved more than 10000 trees in the nearby region.

promotion of literature. Besides, some of our esteem colleagues like Dr. Dilip Alone, Prof. Vijay Waghmare, Prof. Abhijit Aney and Dr. Ajay Deshpande are often entrusted with the responsibility of conducting various programs.

A special mention must be made of Dr. Dilip Alone who has been serving in various capacities like Examiner of Maharashtra State Drama Competition since last 5 years, Governer's Nominee at Dakshin Madhya Sanskritk Kendra, and Education Expert at Vaidhanik Vikas Mandal. He was honored with University Color Coat for working as a manager of women's boxing team at Bilaspur.

The staff members and alumni of the college joined hands with the central library of the town named 'Nagar Vachnalaya', and formulated a program for reviewing world famous books. The series of 25 lectures on renowned books has been completed and another series of lecture on poetry is in progress.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The college is run by a private organization named 'Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Wani enjoying 2f & 12 (B) status of UGC. To optimize funds for creation and enhancement of infrastructure, the college avails itself not only of various schemes of UGC but also of MLA and MP quota of this region. In addition to grants available under developmental and merged schemes, the college secured financial assistance to the tune of Rs. 25 lacks for creating facilities for effective teaching and learning process under Additional Assistance Scheme from UGC. Apart from these, for supporting teaching and learning, individual faculty members submit their requirements to the Principal of the college. Principal in turn gets them sanctioned by authorities like Local Managing Committee and Governing Body of parent organization.

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities – classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

Routine teaching and learning exercises are carried out in twenty one classrooms measuring 13725 sq. ft. Practical classes of Science and Commerce streams are held in six laboratories spread over a total area of 8820 sq. ft. These classrooms and laboratories are connected to the campus through nine students' corridor measuring 3127 sq. ft.

The college has an indoor badminton and table tennis court. The college has an access to two playgrounds of managed by a local government high school and by a school run by parent organization respectively. These grounds are used for outdoor games and athletic events. The college participates in the following sports activities of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, every year.

The college has a spacious auditorium where various cultural & co-curricular activities are held regularly. And the open theatre that it has is used for yoga and other cultural events. Functional English laboratory of the institution works to improve the communicative skill of students.

To cope with the additional rush of students the college needed additional learning space. Hence two more rooms were added to the existing infrastructure. Total amount of money spent on the construction of the said rooms was met partly from UGC grants available during XI plan period (**Rs. Ten Lack**) and partly from the contribution of management (**Rs. Fifteen Lack**). Thus the institution plans and

- optimizes every possible opportunity of developing its infrastructure in line with the academic growth of the institution.
- 4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

As such the number of students with physical disabilities is very small and since library, reading room, some classrooms and auditorium are at the ground level, such students have an easy access to them. Besides, faculty members and the non teaching staff of the college always extend them cooperation wherever essential.

 The college being non-residential is open to day scholars only. However, the authorities had to get a girls' hostel built to accommodate girl students from nearby villages (particularly those who cannot commute between Wani and their places of residences daily) seeking admission to our institution. Accordingly a grant to the tune of Rs. 25 lacks was secured from UGC. The construction of the girls' hostel is nearing completion.

The college conducts annual medical and health check-up camps for all the students of the college. A panel of certified medical practitioners appointed by the college examine and counsel the students. If required students are asked to go for further medical investigation. Counseling sessions on special issues like 'Women and Health' are organized during which girl students of the college are addressed by renowned local gynecologists Dr. Mrs. Munje and Dr. Mrs. Deshpande.

Since there is constraint of space our college optimizes use of available space and infrastructure. Hence units like Grievance Redressal Cell and Women Cell are operated from the chamber adjacent to the Principal's office. Cell used for examination related activities is used for Counseling and Career Guidance and Placement Unit. Although there is no health centre, first aid facility is available in sports and NCC room. Since most of our students are from poor economic background, they carry their own tiffin boxes. The RO water purifier along with water coolers fulfills the need of potable water for students and staff. And as far as recreational and cultural programs of the college are concerned, they are held in the auditorium.

The committee keeps a close watch on students' requirement of text books. Old editions of books are transferred to the reading room where students can use them.

As a new academic session begins, demands for books and journals are sought from the faculty members.



The college has a three-phase electric supply system. Most of the standalone computer systems used by various facility centers are equipped with UPS. Highly sophisticated research equipment such as Atomic Absorption Spectrophotometer are kept in air conditioned rooms.

The career counseling cell is instrumental in counseling the students on a variety of personal, psycho-social and academic fronts in formal and informal ways. The students seek help and advice of the teachers according to their requirements.

As the college is offering conventional undergraduate courses, the opportunity of placement in the industries is available to a limited extent. Ours is the only grant in aid institution of the city, hence we don't have any opportunity of comparison with other parallel institution. We are well aware of the fact that in-spite of all our efforts in teaching learning process still much larger journey is yet to travel. The fact of agriculture background of the students is the root cause of different dimensions with the academic functioning, especially of arts faculty. On many of the occasions the students with inadequate background required to devote substantial amount of time for their farming activities which really made it difficult for them to prepare for university examinations. Still the college feels proud to have produced educated agriculturalists contributing national cause of food production.

A BRIDGE committee called 'Local Managing Committee' is constituted with a due representation of top management and college employees with Principal who is the ex-officio secretary of the same. In our institution valuable services are rendered even by retired teachers

and former non teaching staff members who, as members of managing committee, contribute a lot to the process of designing and implementing quality policy and plans.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission
- formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan
- Interaction with stakeholders
- Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis ,research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders (YCMOU- external candidate accommodation)
- Reinforcing the culture of excellence
- Champion organizational change

The institution has a two-tier leadership in its overall functioning. The parent organization 'Shikshan Prasarak Mandal', Wani is very keen on extending the supportive guiding role by way of resource allocation whenever required. The principal being an operational leader of this institute has a deep involvement in and commitment to execution of the plans, programs, and policies in tune with the mission of the institute. Since Principal is the chairman of almost all the operational committees, necessary organizational changes are incorporated as and when required. The principle of centralization is observed for core activities like framing of policies and strategies whereas the same are implemented in a decentralized manner to ensure institutional enrichment and overall pursuit of excellence.

The leadership of our institution is very keen on ensuring the fulfillment of mission and vision. Our colleagues Prof. Prafulla Kose, Prof. Ravindra Matte and Prof. Umesh Vyas take care of NSS, NCC and Sports departments respectively. These three departments are instrumental in organising co-curricular activities leading to the multidimensional growth of students.

This plan of co-curricular activities is supplemented with skill oriented programs offered by Chemistry, English and Commerce departments. Thus, by undertaking and performing a wide variety of curricular and extra-curricular activities like regular teaching, co-curricular activities, skill oriented programs, remedial coaching arrangements and competitive examination classes we seek to ensure the academic inclusion of a large number of students which constitutes a strategic plan of our institution.

The institutional leadership is very much interested in acquiring timely feedback from students. The formal and informal feedback mechanisms go hand in hand in our institution. A structured questionnaire is designed annually for formal regular feedback. The principal of the college constitutes the feedback committee and looks personally into the designing of questionnaire whereas the timely oral feedback is obtained from the random sample of the students.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The institution follows following procedures to monitor and evaluate policies and plans.

- I) Planning & Execution Mechanism
- II) Framing of Predetermined Objectives
- III) Assigning Responsibilities
- IV) Execution Feedback to be furnished by secretaries of various committees
- V) Review Mechanism

The institution follows a procedure of plan-execute mechanism as a working philosophy. The plans and policies are finalized with predetermined objectives. The task of plan and policy framing is carried out along with establishment of the responsibility center. The task of execution is handed over to the secretary of the committee. A review ensures that the implementation has attained the predetermined objectives of the policies.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The institution grants permission to the faculty members to contest university level elections to academic bodies like Board of Studies and Senate. Faculty members Dr. Dilip Alone and Prof. Arvind Karkhanis (retired) of our institution won university level election and worked as Chairmen of Boards of Studies of Languages in science and Physics respectively.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college provides due space and pace to all its activity centers to groom leaders in accordance with natural talent of individuals. The leadership development is not only restricted to faculty members but also transmitted among the students through their participation in various activities and programs. The leadership grooming is so natural in the academic functioning of the college that some former principals and

presidents of the management of the parent organization for last twenty years are the alumni of this college. Our institution has also provided the well groomed academic leadership in the form of Principals to other academic institutions. Moreover our exprincipal Dr. S.R.Aswale, presently working as the Finance Officer of the Affiliating University attests to the congenial atmosphere of our institution that grooms competent academic leaders.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

It is the age-old practice and philosophy of college to have a decentralized leadership through departmental heads. The departmental heads are authorized to allot workloads, form practical batches, adjust departmental time table in tune with time table of the faculty. Moreover they have the authority to dispose of old and unusable articles and place orders for new purchases after receiving sanction from the higher authority. Departments and units are thus authorized to

- 1) Plan resource requirements
- 2) Procure resources
- 3) Put resources to proper uses
- 4) Preside over the entire process of operational functioning
- 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Our college strongly believes and actively promotes a culture of participative management. The apex body, i.e. Managing Committee, Shikshan Prasark Mandal, Wani provides due opportunity so that the former teaching and non teaching employees can become members and contribute to the process of management. This is a symbol of participative management at the level of **POLICY FRAMING**. The policies thus framed at the apex level are then referred to the planning level of management i.e. towards Local Managing Committee. The composition of LMC itself is an example of principle of participative management, as due representation of present teaching and non teaching staff members is ensured. This symbolizes participative management at the level of **PLANNING**. The functioning of our college further demonstrates this principle of participative management via departmental meetings. Thus participation of all staff members teaching and non teaching is ensured at **OPERATIONAL** level. Moreover the students do have

various platforms like students' council, joint bodies of staff and students at departmental levels to participate in the process of management.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, our college has a formally stated quality policy gifted by late Ram Shewalkar our great Ex-Principal and an outstanding figure in the literary and cultural world of Maharashtra. He joined the institution on 1st August, 1965 and delivered a speech wherein he set forth the quality policy of our institution in the following words: 'Students should be dedicated to the pursuit of studies, Teacher should be dedicated to the pursuit of students' comprehensive development and both of them should be dedicated to the pursuit of knowledge.' The quality policy has been consistently driven, deployed and reviewed through the arrangement of a series of lectures in honor of stalwarts like Tilak, Bapuji Aney and Ram Shewalkar. In the course of lecture series, great icons of academics, literature and research are invited to deliver speeches on a wide variety of topics and their considered views and invaluable thoughts expressed therein impact both faculty members and students.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

To add on new combinations at graduate level

Of late there has been a massive rush of students seeking admission to the science stream of our college. To cope with huge pressure of students, the college authorities have decided to introduce new subjects (like statistics) to cater to the students' requirements. The Local Managing Committee has passed a resolution to this effect and a decision has been taken to approach the parent university for the approval of the same.

To upgrade itself from undergraduate to postgraduate institute.

Currently Post graduate courses are taught in subjects like Marathi, English and History. Now, our institution is actively considering a plan to upgrade its commerce faculty from undergraduate to post graduate level. In this direction an initiative was taken by launching Master degree in commerce at YCMOU Center of our college. Looking at the overwhelming response that the course generated, the LMC took a decision to start M.Com. (Eng. Med.) as a regular post graduate degree course in our college

To strengthen the research contribution of faculty members

The promotion of research constitutes a significant aspect of institutional perspective development. The faculty members and even students are encouraged to participate in conferences and gatherings and to carry out researches. The teachers are allowed to avail duty leave for attending such conferences. Moreover the schemes like Faculty Development Program and Participation of Teachers in Academic Conferences sponsored by UGC are availed for facilitating teachers in a varied manner. The national level conference held in 2012 and organised by the Chemistry department of our college was an humble attempt at boosting research.

- 6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

 The Principal being the academic leader is at the helm of all affairs. The faculty in charges of Arts, Science and Commerce do participate in processes like academic planning and implementation. The Head Clerk of the college supervises the functioning of non teaching employees of the college.
- 6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following
 - Teaching & Learning
 - Research & Development
 - Community engagement
 - Human resource management
 - Industry interaction

Teaching and Learning process is at the centre of institutional functioning. The institution has aptly designed a strategy of supplementing traditional teaching of syllabus with skill oriented dimensions in Arts, Science and Commerce. The remedial coaching centre is instrumental in helping the slow learners and coaching classes for entry in services take due care of the requirements of academically advanced learners. In a nutshell, the institution has designed a strategy of **academic inclusion**.

The faculty members of the college are motivated to attend conferences. The schemes of University Grants Commission namely Faculty Development Program and PTAC are used for the promotion of research. The chemistry laboratory of the college is recognised for doctoral research and few other faculty members are recognised research supervisors. Thus the institution has designed a strategy of offering research facility even at rural level.

The institution has an enriched library to its credit. In order to accord the benefit to society, the top management has decided to open the doors of this learning centre even to the common people of Wani.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback

and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

Head of the institution i.e. Principal is instrumental in mobilizing information and making them available to the top management. The significant matters related to all aspects of the institution are mobilized on the platform of Local Managing Committee. LMC being a combination of Management, Teaching Staff Members and Non Teaching Staff member is an ideal place to accommodate significant information and review all the activities. In some emergencies, the practice of writing a note sheet by the concerned faculty member is followed. Whenever required this note sheet is duly forwarded by the principal to the President of the managing body.

- 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?
 - The management always considers the opinions of the staff members regarding various aspects of academic and administrative functioning. The staff members are free to express their opinions regarding various institutional processes. Wherever and whenever required, meetings with adequate representation of staff members are held. Purchase committee constituted in the college is a case in point. The three faculty members from respective streams along with a management member nominated by the local managing committee and Principal as head of the institution are the regular members on this committee. The concept of Member User department encourages involvement of different people for various purchases on a variety of fronts. Thus encouragement and support are extended by the management for the participation of the staff in improving effectiveness and efficiency.
- 6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.
 - The managing body of the college i.e. Shikshan Prasarak Manadal, Wani passed some resolutions which are at different stages of implementation. Some of the important resolutions are as follows:
 - 1) The management resolved on 9/3/2015 to fill the vacant posts of teaching staff members as sanctioned by the joint director. The committee was constituted for the process of this appointment. Accordingly 11 new faculty members have been appointed in the months of May-June 2015.

- 2) The management resolved on 10/04/2015 to create a corpus fund for infrastructural development of the college. The said fund was established and the new classrooms were constructed out of the same for the college.
- 3) Since the tenure of the officiating Principal Dr. S.R. Warhate was to expire on 21/02/2016, it was resolved on 16/02/2016 that the tenure of the officiating Principal was to be extended by one month and that the process of appointing a regular Principal was to be completed within this time limit. Accordingly, Dr. P.V.Ubale was appointed a regular principal from and on 1st April 2016.
- 4) The management of the institution passed a resolution on 8/6/2016 to complete the construction of a womens' hostel by financing the expenditure over and above the UGC grants. The construction work was taken up accordingly and it is now nearing completion.
- 6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?
 - Yes. Right now the institution is not convinced whether autonomy will be feasible for a rural institution like ours and whether it will lead to improvement of academic standards. However, after reviewing the situation, institution may plan to go for academic autonomy in the near future.
- 6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?
 - A grievance redressal cell has been constituted in the college and a complaint box has been installed. The grievance committee opens the complaint box every fortnight and complaints are discussed and attended to at the meeting.
- 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?
 - There was a single court case filed by a part time employee of the college regarding continuity of his services as a full time employee. Since the adequate workload required for a fulltime post was not available, the court ruled his services could not be regularized.
 - In another instance Prof. M. G. Khade and Prof. Anjali Palnitkar filed suits against Review committee of University and Government regarding their extension of services from the Age 60 to 62, of which college was one of the parties. In both these

cases, the court granted the benefit of extension of age and services and accordingly the above named Associate Professors joined the institution and rendered their services for the remaining tenure.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The institution has a sound mechanism of analyzing student feedback. The issues raised by the students in the course of formal and informal feedback are provided with proper forum and are addressed with due care. The R.O. drinking water facility for the students and reading room facility with internet connectivity are the fruits of such feedback analysis.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The institution allows the teaching staff members to undergo orientation and refresher courses. Moreover, the faculty members are given duty leave to attend short term courses sponsored by UGC. The non teaching staff members are also allowed to undergo their respective training programs. Besides, the non teaching staff members are encouraged to acquire computer knowhow. In all, 19 non teaching staff members have attended following training programs.

The Junior Clerk of the college Shri Vijay Upadhay has programmed the automated T.C. generating spread sheet program and designed software for computerization of scholarship cheques.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The institution has adopted the strategy of multi dimensional communication with the faculty members of the college. The pre assignment counseling is the sophisticated tool essentially followed in our institution. The necessary support of all kinds is duly extended along with the mechanism of know how exchange. Thus ongoing training and retraining facilities that the employees undergo motivate them for higher performance and enable them to perform their roles and discharge their responsibilities.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

Since our institution invariably recruits the best candidates, their performances are usually sound. The academic conduct of all the staff members is under the personal scrutiny of Principal of the college. The feedback provided by the students is utilized for the performance appraisal of the faculty members. Thus the informal system of performance appraisal coupled with the statistical record of classes taken, leaves sought and granted are made available to faculty members for self introspection.

- 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?
 - The management of Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Wani closely reviewed the academic functioning of the college. The academic outcome in terms of students' results was closely reviewed by the management. The management advised the then Principal Dr. Shankar Warhate to devise an effective system of teaching, learning and evaluation. The three-member committee with Principal as a chairman was constituted. As a result a new system of Teaching, Learning and Evaluation was devised and was communicated to the staff members through meetings. The same mode has started functioning from academic year 2014-15.
- 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years? The staff members have voluntarily come up and formed two societies namely 'Cooperative Society of Employees of 'Lokmanya Tilak Mahavidyalaya' and Staff Welfare Society. The contribution of staff members is deducted every month from their salaries and the pull of funds is utilized to disburse loan to eligible and needy staff members. Hundred percent of confirmed employees do avail themselves of the frequent benefit of these two welfare societies.
- 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The institution follows all the norms laid down by regulating authorities to recruit the best candidates. And they are provided with due facilities of a reasonably good grant in aid college. Consequently, the incidences of staff leaving the institute prior to their retirement are very rare.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The governing body of the institution is very keen in observing financial discipline in the college. The Principal, the head of the institution, looks after all financial matters. The institution follows a three-tier mechanism in this regard. Whenever a department requires anything, the requirement is put before the principal in the form of a proposal which is then forwarded to purchase committee comprising three faculty members, principal, a member representative of LMC (ex-office superintendent Shri U.A.Kuchankar) and a representative of respective user department. Sanction is accorded only after budgetary provision and justification of requirements are thoroughly discussed at the meeting. Thus every case of financial expenditure is closely monitored.

- 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.
 - The institution follows the practice of annual audit very seriously. The audit report for the financial year 2015-16 is complete in all aspects. The certification received by the college from the auditor R.G.Nagarwala & Co. attests to the soundness of the financial transactions of the institution for the financial year ended 2015-16. There were no audit objections at all.
- 6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.
- Ours is a grant in aid college and hence the major portion of expenditure i.e. salary of the employees is funded directly from the grants disbursed by the state government. Moreover, some grants are also received for administrative and developmental works from state government and funding agency like UGC.
- 6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).
 - The institution is very keen in approaching the University Grants Commission for various types of grants and schemes. During eleventh and twelfth five year plans our institution availed itself of various schemes like remedial coaching, entry in services, career counseling cell, additional assistance, capacity building and other merged schemes and utilized financial assistance obtained from the funding agency. Needless to repeat, full utilization of these grants facilitated improvement of

infrastructure, up-gradation of equipment and impartment of additional knowledge content to the students.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

- 6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)
 - a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

 The institution underwent the first cycle of accreditation in the year 2005 and was placed under B+ grade. The IQAC was established in the same year as a part of post accreditation exercise. However due to some organizational changes the continuity in the functioning of IQAC was hampered. The university grants commission provided a seed money for the establishment of IQAC in the year 2013. By utilizing the seed money, IQAC was reconstituted with an institutional policy of continuous up-gradation. As a matter of institutionalizing the quality assurance processes, the first move of reconstituted IQAC is to go for second phase of NAAC accreditation.
 - b) How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

IQAC

The management approved a large number of decisions of IQAC and almost all of them were actually implemented. The few examples are as below

- 1) Change in SPOT admission method of B.Sc. and B.com. to MERIT list method.
- 2) Instead of Academic Diary, a new method of Teaching Learning Evaluation Model has been adopted.
- 3) Installation of language laboratory.
- c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes. IQAC has representation of the society and industry. Their practical experiences are of great use for improving the quality parameters of the institution. The commerce faculty of the college initially started with Marathi medium. But with the input from the industry representation, a decision was taken to provide a facility of English medium to students who wanted to opt for English medium.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

The variety of experiences that the alumni gather from the market and the difficulties that the students face and the comments that they make on education help IQAC to review functioning of the college, reconsider modes and policies of the institution leading to improvement of overall standard.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

IQAC conducts several meetings with different sections of the staff. The teaching and non teaching staff members are encouraged to actively participate in discussions.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

The institution has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. The Principal being the chairman of IQAC and the member secretary of LMC is instrumental in approving quality policies decided by the IQAC at the level of LMC. IQAC which is the forum for initiating discussion on quality issues receives infrastructural and financial support from LMC.

- 6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

 Institution motivates the teaching and non teaching staff members to attend various short term programs to upgrade skill and knowledge.
- 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The concept of academic audit has been followed in an informal manner. From time to time Principal interacts with the students and seeks their opinions on a wide variety of academic issues which enable him to keep track of academic matters. At the end of the session, feedback received from the students, their performances in the university examinations and the principal's own observations thereon are put together and placed in front of the management for further discussion and decision. The management and principal put their heads together and deliberate on the available data and chalk out appropriate strategies for the next academic session. Last but not the least, wherever necessary, some faculty members are consulted with

a view to improving overall standard of the institution.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The IQAC cell plays a crucial role in keeping a tab on the quality requirements laid down by external agencies and regulatory authorities. For instance, as soon as the parent university introduced the scheme of internal marking for commerce streams and languages, the IQAC designed the internal evaluation schedule accordingly.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The IQAC has devised a TLE Model to evaluate the teaching learning process continuously. Every faculty member maintains a record of classes taken on daily basis in the form TLE 1. This sheet along with a weekly consolidated sheet i.e. TLE 2(containing signatures of departmental heads) are handed over to the office. The data obtained from the sheet are consolidated and weekly index is prepared which shows number of classes actually taken out of total allotment.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The institution follows a dual method of communication i.e. written and oral with reference to its quality assurance policies. The prospectus, notice boards and college magazines, college website are some of the platforms of written communication, while verbal interactions with stake holders constitute oral mode during which quality policies are discussed and evaluated.

CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

As yet the institution has not conducted any green audit of its campus and facilities from the certified agencies. However institution spares no pains to spread environmental awareness among people in general and students in particular. Lectures on go green concept and dissemination of tree plantation culture from institute to families are regularly arranged by the science faculty of the college.

- 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college, within its own limitations, has been striving hard for an eco-friendly campus. Uses of Solar Lights, CFL, switches installed on the doors fronts of all classrooms controlling the use of electricity and installation of electric savers have reduced electric consumption. A rain water harvesting unit working in the campus enables to conserve water. The NSS and NCC units of the college along with the botany department planted more than 10000 trees in the surrounding areas of Wani. The college motivates students to stop using polythene bags. Moreover the computer peripherals in working condition but of no use to learning system of the college have been handed over to other learning institutions.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

The institution introduced a Teaching Learning Evaluation Model two years ago. The daily teaching records of all faculty members are entered in the sheet called TLE 1. At the end of the week the data from TLE 1 are synchronized in the weekly sheet called TLE 2 and both the sheets are handed over to the office. IQAC cell extracts the information of classes taken and an academic execution index is prepared at the end of every week.

The administrative wing of the college is going for office automation. Shri Vijay Upadhey, Junior Clerk who has developed software for computerized T.C. generation and computerization of Scholarship Cheques has received encouragement from management for his innovative approach.

Format for Presentation of Best Practice

1. Title of the Practice

Dramatization of syllabus leading to effective Teaching-Learning and Evaluation.

2. Goal

Our institution always lays emphasis on making the teaching learning process thought-provoking, novel and student-centric. Encouragement is always given to such persons as are capable of adopting innovative approaches which make the activity of imparting knowledge interesting and relevant to the students' requirements. We are glad to say that one of our esteemed colleagues Dr. Dilip Alone of Marathi department achieved just such an outstanding feat when he successfully recast 'Birhad', an autobiography by Shri Ashok Pawar prescribed for the B.A. final year students, into a drama.

3. The Context

The autobiography entitled 'Birhad', deals with the hardships of social underdogs (V.J. N.T.) living inhuman and subhuman lives on the peripheries of villages, towns and cities. The gravity of the issues discussed in the book could not be experienced and understood fully by mere reading of the same. Therefore, Dr. Dilip Alone transformed an autobiography into a play with a view to making the book interesting and its messages socially relevant leading to mass awareness. Initially the play was presented in the class room with some students playing different roles. The impact of this first experiment was so overwhelming that Dr. Alone made a point to take this activity to its logical conclusion. Encouraged by the former President of Shikshan Prasarak Mandal Adv. Shri Anantraoji Deshpande and the then Principal Dr. Shashikantji Aswale, Dr. Alone continued his experiment by including students from Arts and Commerce faculties in the cast.

4. The Practice

After having identified the main characters, leading roles were allotted to ten students and the first show was performed in the auditorium of our college with the active cooperation of not less than fifty students. The response to the maiden show was so massively positive that a decision to stage it at the University level youth festival was taken. When the play was staged at the university, it appealed to a more responsive and appreciative audience and two students of ours named Dinesh Watkar and Shewta Nasare of B.Com. second year playing the central roles of Ashok Pawar and Yashoda bagged university color coats. Thereafter the college team kept receiving invitations for staging the play from various places. The team successfully staged the play at some places but, due to factors like distance and shortage of time, it could not honor all the

invitations. In order to solve this problem, Dr. Dilip Alone converted the drama into a

short film.

5. Evidence of Success

The dramatic form of Birhad became the focal point of literary conversation for some

length of time. Besides, it was performed before the participants of Refresher Course at

R.T.M. Nagpur University and before the delegates of 86th All India Literary

Conference at Chandrapur. The movie Birhad was released by the then Hon'ble

President of India Mrs. Pratibhatai Patil. It was telecast on the UCN Channel Nagpur

for five times and was also nominated for Film Festival at Nagpur. The grand success

of this practice can be underlined from the fact that our college received an award of

Innovative Practices from Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University. Thus our institution

nurtures all kinds of activity-based learning culture for the students of the rural area.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

This kind of practice requires huge financial resources at the disposal of institution as it

is non-earning but cost incurring program. As far as the students are concerned, they

cannot take their time off from their regular academic routine very frequently to take part

in rehearsals and stage performances.

7. Notes (Optional)

The college has a regular practice of staging small dramas, street shows and role

plays to make the syllabus contents more interesting and lively. On many occasions

the students of the college have won university color coats in the Youth Festival in

drama category for their outstanding performances. Arvind Mahalaxame and Pramod

Bhoyar in 'Platform No. 4', Anand Bothale and Priyanka Jonnalwar in K'ehl

Mandiyala', Pallavi Khadakhadi in 'Renu Navachi Por', Dinesh Watkar and Shewta

Nasare in 'Birhad', Bharat Lohakare in 'Teri Meri Prem Kahani' are some cases in

point.

2. Goal

Like all good institutions our college too places emphasis on acquiring, accumulating and disseminating ideas and knowledge especially for the benefit of society in general and learners' community in particular. This it seeks to achieve by arranging various programs.

3. The Context

The credit of inaugurating the noble tradition of lecture series in our college goes to former Principal and legendary orator Late Shri Ram Shewalkar. The first in the series named after the illustrious leader and freedom fighter Shri Lokmanya Tilak was started from 1st August 1965. Coincidentally on the same day Shri Ram Shewalkar assumed the charge of Principal of our college and delivered the maiden lecture in Shri Lokmanya Tilak Lecture series. The second lecture series was launched on and from 26th January 1969 and it was named after Shri Loknayak Bapuji Aney. The latest in the series is Shri Ram Shewalkar Lecture series which began in the year 2009. The leading orators of the state and the nation including Shri Ram Shewalkar, Shri Narhar Kurandakar, Setu Madhavrao Pagadi, Shri Madhukar Bhave, Shri Purshottam Bhave, Shri Gangadhar Pantavane, Smt. 4. The Practice

H) Establishment of Learning Center: A Library at Murdhoni Gram

The NSS unit of the college adopted a neighbouring village named Murdhoni and with the cooperation of the students started a library. Before the establishment of the library, both the students and the teachers were informed about the project and asked to donate as many books as they could. The library started functioning with five hundred books (by and large on competitive examinations) donated by them. The registered library that was handed over to a local committee (comprising enthusiastic young people) has been working well for last five years.
